TRENDING DESTINATIONS OF OMAN



MUSCAT

Muscat, Oman's port capital, sits on the Gulf of Oman, surrounded by mountains and desert. Muscat is famous for dazzling souks and superb seafood, but its terrain brings the biggest thrills. This Middle East port city is a great place to trek deserts at dawn, spot dolphins at sunset, and enjoy plenty of Omani hospitality. Standing guard over the palace are the twin forts of Al Jalali and Al Mirani, which have been converted to museums and are open to the public. Non-Muslim travelers can also visit the breathtaking Sultan Qaboos Grand Mosque on most mornings, admiring features like an enormous crystal chandelier, marble wall panels, and the second largest Persian carpet in the world..

SALALAH

Salalah is in part of the Arabian Peninsula touched by the Indian Ocean monsoon and thus is verdant during the summer. Salalah is the historic center of Dhofar, famous in ancient times as a source of frankincense, and was described by Marco Polo in the 13th century as a prosperous city that attracts many tourists from around the globe and other parts of Oman during the monsoon/kharif season, In this season, the mountains turn green, and there are many waterfalls to visit, such as Wadi Darbat, Ain Athum, Ain Tubrook, Ain Khor etc.

Salalah is famous for its lights that sparkle through the night's lyrical breezes and the day's sun's rays beating down on the waves that dance in celebration of Salalah's eternal spring. It is the second-largest city in Oman, but the biggest in Dhofar, and the biggest seaport in the Arab Peninsula. The most definite best time to visit Salalah is during the monsoon (khareef) season that lasts from July end - September when the desert transforms into a lush, green oasis! Concerts are organised and singers from the Gulf and other Arabic countries also participate. Salalah is a photographer's paradise during these months.





JEBEL AL AKDHAR

Jebel Akhdar, known for its traditional rose water extraction and agricultural products including pomegranates, walnuts, apricots, black grapes, and peaches. It is also the site of honeybee breeding for much of Oman. March and April can be a good time to visit Oman as these months are usually less busy than the winter months of November to February. Spring is the best time to visit Jebel Akhdar (Green Mountain) when the terrace plantations are lush and vibrant and the roses are in bloom. Some visitors to Jebel Akhdar camped on a plateau to enjoy the scenery. "The snow is fluffy and pure white here, just like in Europe.

A guided walk is a good way to see both the villages and the hidden gardens and orchards that give the region its name. We can arrange a walk that begins at the village of Al Aqur and offers views of the Wadi Al Muaydin and nearby villages. The route lets you explore villages such as Wadi Bani Habib, an abandoned settlement of mud buildings that are slowly decaying back into the ground. There's a footpath down to the bottom of the wadi where you'll see walnuts and pomegranate trees.

SOHAR

Sohar is a port city on Oman's northern coast. Facing the Gulf of Oman, the centuries-old Sohar Fort houses a museum exploring the city's cultural and trading past. Sohar Corniche stretches along the waterfront with a park, restaurants, and a fish market. To the west is a camel-racing track. Sohar is also a base for exploring the craggy banks of nearby ravines, including Wadi Al Jizi and Wadi Salahi. Sohar is midway between Muscat and Dubai. Sohar has many tourist spots of outstanding beauty decorated with lush green mountains, turquoise water, golden desert, and ancient forts and museums.

This is an attractive region for tourists due to its clean, safe beaches and the plethora of archaeological features. Visitors will be attracted to its large souq with handy tailors, fruit sellers and fishermen vying for space, and its fort, which stands apart with its four-story walls and six towers, an imposing sight overlooking the bay. Sohar is one of the oldest towns in Oman, and was for many centuries the most important port and commercial centre in the country.





JEBEL AL SHAMS

Jebel Shams is a mountain located in northeastern Oman, and it is the first place to receive sunrise in Oman due to its high peak. It is the highest mountain in the Hajar range and the country. The mountain is a popular sightseeing area located 240 kilometers from Muscat. In the summer, the temperature is around 20 °C, and in the winter, it drops to less than 0 °C. Jabal Shams, its name, is popularly given to the whole area, including Wadi Ghul and Wadi Nakhr. The narrow and deep gorge is one of the top places to visit in Oman, often called the Arabian Grand Canyon.

Jabal Shams offers various activities for all people, whether you are interested in night photography, demanding hiking to the peak, exploring abandoned villages, camping under the stars or just a bit of off-roading. Jabal Shams is a great place to escape the city lights and gaze at the starlit night sky. The Jabal Shams Balcony Walk is the most recommended route for casual hikes as it is an easy hike through the rim of the 'Grand Canyon' starting from Al Khitaym village.

NIZWA

It's known for Nizwa Fort, a castle with a huge cylindrical tower built in the 17th century. Rich in history and culture, the place holds, still to this day, the importance it conquered in past centuries through its connection between the rugged interior and the other regions of the coastal plain. Marked by a grand new double-arched gateway, the town forms a natural access point for the historic sites of Bahla and Jabrin and for excursions up the mountain roads to Jebel Akhdar and Jebel Shams. It was named the Capital of Islamic Culture in 2013. The city is known for date cultivation, the most highly prized varieties of which are khalas and khumaizi.

Nizwa is famous for its handcrafted silver khanjars (daggers), and noted for silver craftsmanship, you can find good pieces at the souq. The souq is also a good source for antiques, including Maria Theresa thalers, once used as Oman's official currency. Vanilla, saffron, spices, dried lemons and nuts of all types are also good purchases, and can be found in the older section of the souq. This is also a good place to pick up some of Nizwa's prized dates.





KHASAB/MUSANDAM

Khasab is a port city on northern Oman's Musandam Peninsula. Khasab Fort has crenellated stone turrets, model wooden boats, and a museum with handicrafts and archaeological finds. From Khasab Harbor, wooden boats cruise the Strait of Hormuz, offering rugged coastal views and dolphin sightings. South, past mountain villages and green valleys, Jabal Hareem Peak is known for its marine fossils.

Known for its fjords, coral reefs, colored fishes, and dolphins, experience Khasab and the sea on a half-day dhow cruise. Snorkeling or swimming in crystal-clear waters, kayaking through narrow fjords, and exploring the entire Khorshem area with the Khasab Musandam boat trips. The cruise often includes stops at historical landmarks such as Telegraph Island and Seebi Island, as well as traditional villages nestled in the mountains. The Musandam Peninsula, which is in the far north of Oman, is well-known for its dazzling fjords and untamed mountainous landscape. A tour usually includes a visit to local fishing villages and historical sites such as ancient castles and forts from the Portuguese era.

DUQUM

Duqm, a port town on the coastal strip of the Arabian Sea open to the Indian Ocean, is the unique blend of modern amenities and traditional Omani culture, creating a distinct and unforgettable experience. Visitors can gather with family and friends in an estate during the evening or at night under the light of the moon or stars, while still being close to the vibrant Bedouin lifestyle. Duqm's location, picturesque beaches, and natural beauty make it an ideal destination for tourists seeking a relaxing holiday.

Duqm is also an optimal site for those interested in practicing various sports hobbies, including fishing, diving, and other water sports. The city offers a range of sports facilities and activities that cater to different interests and skill levels. Moreover, Duqm is an important site for those interested in visiting the Arabian Oryx Reserve, which is located nearby.





RAS AL JINS

One of the most popular eco-tourism activities in Oman is turtle viewing and tours. Ras Al Jins is a nesting site for green turtles, as is also the beach at the local village of Ras al Hadd, which is home to a well-known turtle reserve. Oman is home to several important nesting sites of four different species of turtles: the endangered Green Turtle, the Olive Ridley Turtle, the Loggerhead Turtle, and the critically endangered Hawksbill Turtle. While it's not known to many, the best time to travel and see the turtle hatching in Oman is during summertime, between May and September. Because Oman is in the Middle East and understandably so, there is always that hesitation about traveling due to the temperature and humidity. Enjoy sunset or sunrise on a beautiful beach while the large turtles make their nest or go to the sea.

WAHIBA SANDS

In the heart of eastern Oman, the Wahiba Sands is an ocean of regular dunes that seem to stretch out endlessly. Pale gold at noon, the towering piles of sand shift between rich yellow and coppery orange when the sun is at lower angles. An overnight stay here offers an easy way to experience the primal power of the desert from the comfort of luxe camps. The sands are an important piece of the puzzle that is Oman, and you can add a night to any itinerary. It's an especially good place for a family adventure.

For a wholly authentic experience, you can choose to stay in a traditional black-wool tent, though if you prefer more creature comforts, you can choose a more indulgent tent that boasts air conditioning. Once the sun has set, dine on local cuisine like lamb and mint tea served on low tables around a crackling fire. The best time to visit Wahiba Sands is during the months of October to March.





DIMANIYAT ISLAND

The Daymaniyat Islands are surrounded by turquoise waters and stunning coral reefs that are perfect for snorkeling and diving. The Daymaniyats consist of nine islands and many submerged rocks, in an east to west alignment, which form the base for well, developed coral reefs. Abundant coral growth extends to up to 20 m depth, in water that has the highest clarity of any coral growing area in Oman. The species-abundance structure for the area is magnificent.

These islands offer 12 dive sites located 35 minutes from the Dive Centre, beautiful coral gardens, reefs, walls, large pelagic fish, turtles, rays, leopard sharks and the whale shark is a frequent visitor. The islands are formed from ancient fossil reefs and limestone that have emerged from the ocean.

TOP ACTIVITIES WE ARRANGE IN OMAN

Scuba Diving

Oman has a coastline that extends over 1600 kilometers, providing one of the most untouched prime diving destinations in the world. With a wealth of sea flora and marine life that includes many kinds of pelagic species, there is something for divers of every experience level to discover amongst its hidden underwater treasures.



Rock Climbing

Having a landscape that is famed world over for its rugged mountains and jutting cliffs that plunge straight into the Arabian Sea, the Sultanate has been one of the top spots for pioneering rock climbers since the 1980s. For the rock climber, every mountain face presents an enigmatic challenge with a maze of spurs, wadis, and deep canyons.



Camel Racing

Camels have been an integral part of the Omani lifestyle since the ancient times. Camel racing is an exciting sport that is very much like horse racing; camels and their owners congregate on racetracks to compete. Racing camels are bred for the track and are highly prized possessions.



Trekking

Nothing could be more exciting than discovering the Sultanate's scenic mountain beauty on foot. Though the official trekking season in the country runs from September to May, it is preferable to go on a trekking expedition after October, or before April, to stay away from the harsh heat.



Dolphin Watching

Muscat and Musandam are renowned for their status as the dolphin watching regions of Oman, although this activity can also be enjoyed in the governorates of AI Sharqiyah, AI Wusta, and Dhofar. The best season for sighting dolphins (up to 21 species) is between October and May, during the wee hours of the morning, or late evening.



Game Fishing

As the waters of Oman's coast are home to one of the most diverse aqua life forms in the world, it goes without saying that game fishing has picked up in popularity as a sport over the years. Species such as marlin and tuna are highly sought. The sport is affordable, and even novices can try their luck at bagging one.



Dune Bashing

An adrenaline-pumping and alternate form of what is popularly known as off-roading, dune bashing is Oman's most popular adventure sport for the arduous thrill lover. This exhilarating sport is best experienced in the sturdy comfort of a 4x4 sports utility vehicle driven by a seasoned guide in alternating speeds of slow and fast over the shifting sands of the dunes.



Desert Camping

To truly experience the nomadic heritage and lifestyle of the ancient Arabs, Oman offers tourists and vacationers alike the sheer delight of outdoor camping. Held under the glittering skies of the Al Sharqiyah desert, cultural enthusiasts can witness the traditional houses and livelihood of the local Bedouin population and discover rare species of plant and animal life, If visiting through October to April, one can also cheer on the Bedouin camel races taking place during the season.



Turtle Watching

Thousands of sea turtles migrate annually from the shores of the Arabian Gulf, the Red Sea and Somalia to lay their eggs on the Sultanate's shores. Oman has five of the seven species of sea turtles, and are plentiful on the beaches of Ras Al Hadd, Ras Al Jinz, the Masirah Island, and the Al Daymaniyat Islands. Green turtles, loggerheads, Hawksbill, and leatherbacks return every year to the same sites to lay their eggs.



Cruising

Cruises in Oman, whether it is watching dolphins or sailing, are an inseparable part of its history. Oman is surrounded by the sea and Omanis are famous for their love of their azure waters. There is barely a beach in Oman that does not organize such trips since many areas of the country's natural scenery can be reached only by boat.



FAMOUS WADIS OF OMAN

WADI AL ARBAYEEN

Wadi Al Arbayeen, one of the most beautiful Wadis of Oman, lays just off the wilayat of Quriyat in the Al Sharqiyah region of the country. Abundant with natural pools and stunning greenery, this untouched strip of wonder is the perfect place for you if are a fan of adventure.



WADI SHAB

Wadi Shab is a happy, lively picnic spot for locals and tourists to gather in on the weekends and holidays and make merry. Be a part of the joy and dive in the crisp pools or indulge in sumptuous traditional barbecues with native Omanis. Do not miss out on the waterfall cave.



WADI AL HOQAIN

Wadi Al Hoqain is a gorgeous abode of lush greenery, cool breeze, and waterfalls plunging into sparkling, silver pools that reflect the balmy Omani sunshine in ripples which are bound to mesmerize you. Famous for its year-round flowing streams and ever-flowing water springs.



WADI BANI AUF

If you are into hardcore adrenaline pumping adventurism, the Wadi awaits you with a plethora of activities and sightseeing, all undertaken on foot. Your sight gets treated with glimmering lakes and peaceful foliage where you can unwind for a night of camping.



WADI BANI KHALID

Weaving up across the Eastern Al Hajar Mountains down to the village of Bida, lies the spectacular Wadi Bani Khalid, one of the most fertile valleys in the Sultanate with lush greenery all around and gorgeous waterfalls that form natural pools and creates a loud rushing sound.



WADI DARBAT

TOP MOUNTAINS IN OMAN

JEBEL SHAMS

Jebel Shams, translated as Mountain of the Sun, is Oman's highest peak. The mountain is also featured by its view of the spectacular deep Wadi Ghul lying alongside it. With views of the Al Nakhur Canyon labelled as "The Grand Canyon" of Arabia, Jabal Shams Oman is one of the must visit attractions for any visitor.



AL JABAL AL AKDHAR

Al Jabal Al Akdhar (with a temperature up to 20 degrees cooler) is a hidden paradise full of gardens, vegetation, and orchards that are secreted from view among the mazes of flowing wadis and terraces. The cool mountain air and high level of rainfall provides ideal conditions for cropping all kinds of temperate fruit.



JEBEL SAMHAN

Jebel Samhan, one of the more popular touristic destinations of the Governorate of Dhofar, especially during the Khareef (July – September), when its slopes and plains are lush with greenery, Landscapes of varying flora and rocky fields of leafless desert twisted frankincense trees, flowing streams, and lively animal reserves.



JEBEL GHAWIL

Tucked away in the north-western fringes of the village of Abud, Jebel Ghawil stands as the fondly known 'Grey Mountain' in the Governorate of Buraimi. Jebel Suweini, the peak is a popular destination for arduous mount climbing and trekking, as well as sightseeing of flowering Caralluma Arabica and fascinating bat species.



JEBEL MISHT

Jebel Misht, the French Pillar, stands at the end of the 1979 French Pillar route that follows from Ibri to the south-east face of the peak. The landscape of Jebel Misht does with its stunning desert hybrid lines of the Walked Spur of the Grandes Jorasses and The Nose of El Capitan, both climbs of similar scale.





FAMOUS FORTS OF OMAN

MUTRAH FORT

Located on top of rocky hills, the Muttrah Fort stands tall against the sea and strong winds that waft the fragrant memory of ships gone by, ships that once sailed these azure waters. This fort dominates the eastern end of the Muttrah Harbor with three towers: a huge one sitting on the summit and the other two are located to the west and the north.

AL JALALI FORT

Built in the 1580s by the Portuguese, the Al Jalali Fort, is situated in Old Muscat and overlooks the stunning Sea of Oman. The fort consists of two imposing towers connected by a wall punctuated by holes for cannons. The building is completely isolated and can be accessed from a small bridge and stairway ending at one of the holdouts for a safe exit.

AL MIRANI FORT

Also known as the Al Gharbiya Fort, the Al Mirani Fort is the neighboring bastion of the Al Jalali Fort that renders a marvelous spectacle of the Omani-Portuguese architecture of the early times. Commanding a sight of high rocky hills at the end of the west wall, it can be reached by climbing a flight of stairs carved into the rock.







THE NIZWA FORT

Considered to be the largest of its kind on the Arabian Peninsula, the Nizwa Fort towers above its surroundings, standing as a reminder of the important status that the city of Nizwa once held as the Islamic, political and cultural capital of Oman. This enormous fort features a huge central tower which has an outer diameter of 43 meters.

SOHAR FORT

The Fort of Sohar holds the fascinating Sohar Fort Museum within its walls which regales the details of the history of the city of Sohar, Being an imminent historical landmark, the Sohar Fort Museum also highlights the important role played by the copper trade in this city and its relationship with the city of Canton in China.

THE BAHLA FORT

The Bahala Fort is one of the oldest and largest in Oman and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The fort is built of mud bricks and is surrounded by a wall with watchtowers and battlements. The Bahla Fort is an excellent example of traditional Omani architecture and is considered one of the most important historical sites in the country.







AL HAZM FORT & CASTLE

The Hazm Castle is a marvel of the architectural prowess of its builders and is a vivid example of Islamic constructional masterpieces. The colossal wooden doors are intricately carved and have receptacles for pouring boiling oil or date honey on intruders. Set on the banks of a wadi, this building is a great place to explore.

RUSTAQ FORT

This fort takes many visitors by surprise due to its small entrance that opens up to colossal walls. Consisting of two floors, a mosque, prison, and water wells, also has four towers: The Red Tower, The Wind Tower, The Devil's Tower, and The Modern Tower. Climbing to the highest point of the towers gives a view of the beautiful mountains.

KHASAB CASTLE AND KANDRA FORT

The Khasab Castle was constructed over the ruins of the Old Portuguese castle that was erected in the 17th century to keep a watchful eye on the Strait of Hormuz. A short walk away is the smaller Kamadra Fort which has spectacular mountain views from its battlements.







THE BARKA FORT

Barka Fort, is an old Islamic fort located in Al Batinah, famed in Omani history for being the site of the ousting of the Persians by Ahmed Bin Said in 1747. Having been renovated in the 1980s, the fort has four towers, one of which has an unusual octagonal structure. The fort renders an excellent view of the sea and its surrounding areas.

THE JABRIN CASTLE

The Jabrin Castle is one of the Oman's most fascinating and awe-inspiring buildings, full of amazing details, intricate frescoes, and elaborate inscriptions that distinguish it from the Sultanate's other castles. The Jabrin Castle is an authentic expression of Omani craftsmanship, render stunning photographic opportunities for the visitor.

THE TAQAH CASTLE

The Taqah Casatle is considered one of the most prominent historical monuments in the Wilayat of Taqah because of its vital role as an administrative center for the affairs of the state in the past. Taqah Fort is characterized by its beautiful, high-level artistic colors and its multiple windows, which are equipped with interlocking wooden curtains and arches.







THE MIRBAT CASTLE

The Mirbat Fort is one of the prominent historical landmarks in the Wilayat of Mirbat. The total area of the Fort is 467 square meters, and its height is 12 meters. The building consists of two floors and contains two towers, one in the southwest corner and the other in the southeast corner.

NAKHAL FORT

Nestled amongst the lush palm orchards with stunning views of the wadi and green plantations, the Nakhal Fort is one of the most prominent of historical monuments in Oman. The interesting aspect is its constructed with no particular architectural plan; built around an irregularly shaped rock, which has become a part of the building itself.

THE IBRI FORT

Built more than 400 years ago, the Ibri Fort stands at the site of utmost prominence in the city of Ibri, where merchants travelling between different regions of the Arabian Peninsula stopped to trade their goods. The area today has become home to the bustling Ibri Souq, which is full of traditional handicrafts and silverware.







AL HILA FORT

Stands the 450-year-old Al Hila Fort, Imposing and large, this fort features many unique rooms and long corridors with traditional architecture and motifs, making it a great place to explore. A staircase leading to the roof gives a panoramic view of the town, the market, and the neighboring Al Khandaq Castle.

BILAD SUR CASTLE

Believed to have been constructed in 1800 with an objective of warding off enemy tribes, the Bilad Sur Castle is a majestic fortress that stands proudly on the Bilad Sur Plain. The castle consists of different towers known as A'Souq, Jalan, Al Khandaq, and an extraordinarily shaped fourth one that has two stories.

SUNAYSILAH FORT

The castle, located in the middle of Snaisla Arae, is built on a classic square plan with four round watchtowers. The rooms inside have various traditional artefacts like poetry, Quran stands, carpets etc. One can't miss the castle, as its presence looms over the town center. The Fort Offers a magnificent view of the Sur City.
